It is 10,000 children from orphanages who have found new families. It is 3.5 million civilians in Donbass who received support in the worst moments of their lives. Since its inception, the Foundation has helped survive five million people.

The Foundation has been helping not only individuals, but also seeks to address the country's endemic problems faced by millions of Ukrainians.

The scale of the assistance has made the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation the biggest personal charitable initiative in Ukraine.

However, hope that comes together with help is much more important than the impressive numbers. It is care that everyone who is in need feels and faith that helps people live.

Rinat Akhmetov – Saving Lives

Since its inception, the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation has placed special emphasis on addressing issues in the health care system. For the past 15 years, the Foundation has implemented many projects to support and develop the sector. In 2019, all healthcare projects were brought under one umbrella.

This is how the program *Rinat Akhmetov – Saving Lives* emerged, striving to improve the quality of healthcare services in the country. Its national-scale projects have brought a fundamental change and set a trend to introduce European standards in Ukraine's public healthcare system.

Medical devices and equipment donated to clinics and hospitals will help provide high-tech medical care to patients for years to come.



Fighting COVID-19 in Ukraine

The fight against COVID-19 is a hallmark of the Foundation's anniversary year. Rinat Akhmetov was the first to help the country. In February 2020, well before the quarantine, he pooled the resources of his Foundation, FC Shakhtar, DTEK, Metinvest, and other SCM businesses to help Ukraine and allocated over UAH 300 million for the fight against the pandemic.

The project *Fighting COVID-19 in Ukraine* was launched as part of the program *Rinat Akhmetov – Saving Lives* to provide consistent support to public hospitals. Jointly with SCM businesses, the Foundation purchases and donates to Ukrainian doctors everything they need most to combat the pandemic. This ranges from personal protective gear to sophisticated medical equipment, from test kits to special medical clothing.

However, ventilators remain the biggest medical need. This is why the Foundation has purchased over 200 modern ventilators for Ukrainian doctors.

Volodymyr Buria, a doctor from Sloviansk Regional Children's Hospital, has been an intensive care physician for 25 years.

Over this time, he has seen quite a great deal of things, but recent years have turned to be a real test: first, it was the war and then the coronavirus. With the onset of the pandemic, a number of patients has increased significantly. Many of them need mechanical ventilation. Until recently, the hospital had had only one ventilator, a true rarity manufactured 40 years ago. When it was on, the entire hospital could hear that. Now the hospital will write it off, because it has received a new cutting-edge device as part of the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation's support to the doctors.

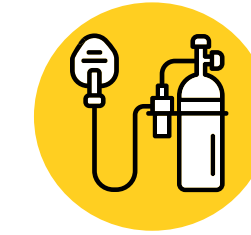

200 Ambulances for Ukraine

200 Ambulances for Ukraine is the largest private charitable project in the area of emergency medical assistance in the history of independent Ukraine. Launched on June 26, 2019 on the initiative of Rinat Akhmetov, it has donated 200 well-equipped special vehicles to public healthcare facilities across the country. The vehicles are of three types: emergency care vehicles for adult patients, resuscitation vehicles for new-borns, and off-road medical vehicles designed to operate in mountainous and remote areas. In many amalgamated communities, doctors have received such high-class vehicles for the first time ever. The project has taken the quality of emergency medical care in Ukraine to the next level.

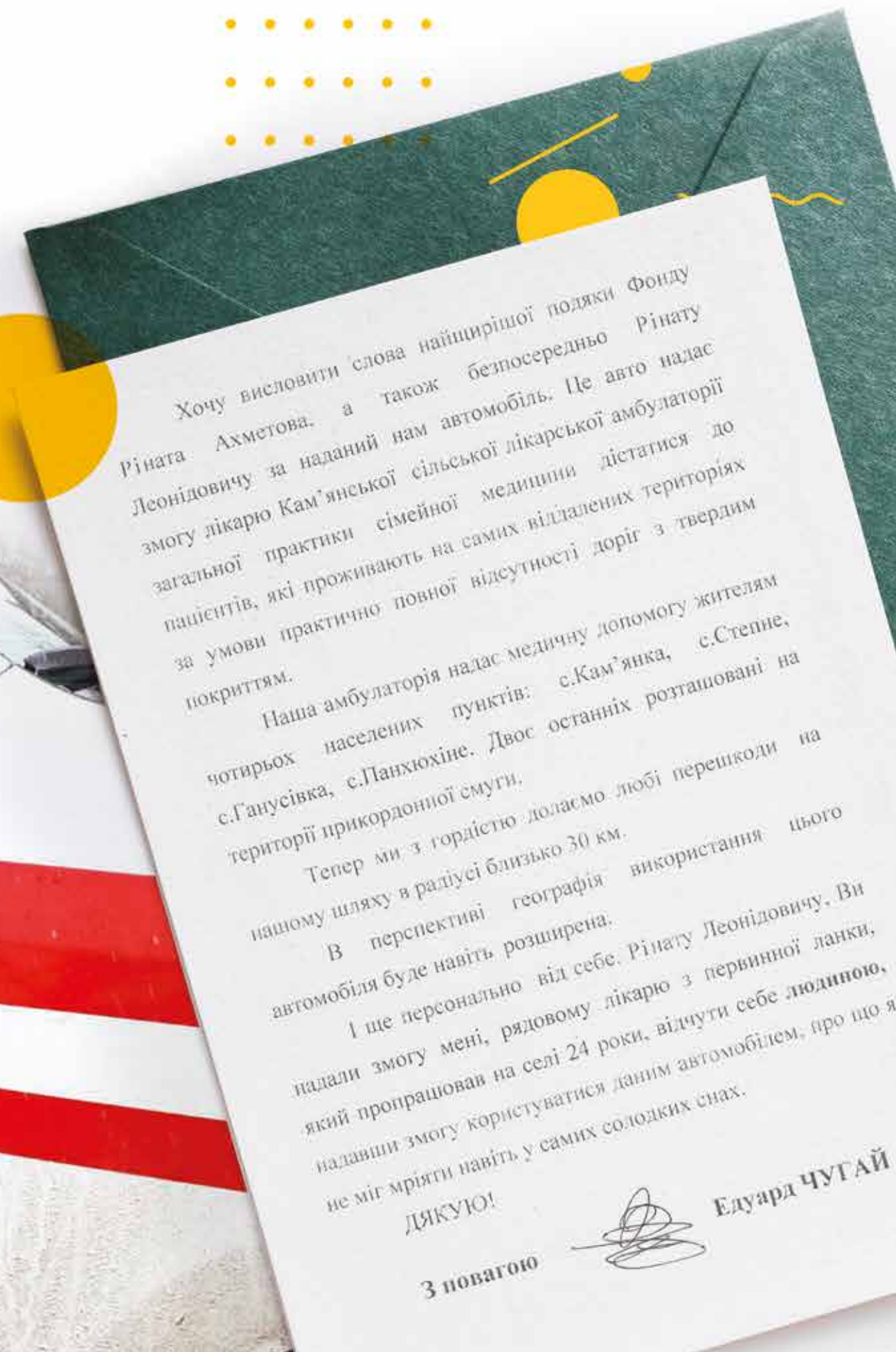

Eduard Chuhay is an ordinary primary care physician. He works in an outpatient clinic in Kamianka village, Luhansk Oblast. He has been saving lives and treating his fellow villagers and residents of neighbouring localities for 24 years. Rural health care has its own specific features, like long distances, low population density, and bad roads. At times, getting to patients is very difficult. However, this has ceased to be a pressing problem for Eduard and his colleagues. Now doctors go to patients on a medical Toyota Land Cruiser off-roader.

Kamianka outpatient clinic has received the off-road vehicle under the project 200 Ambulances for Ukraine.

Tetiana Budynska saves children's lives. She heads the anaesthesiology and intensive care department in Poltava Regional Children's Clinical Hospital. The healthcare facility has received a neonatal vehicle from the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation. The vehicle has already helped doctors save and take care of the little Ukrainians many times.

"We had one of the latest cases in Pyriatyn Hospital. A boy was born at 36 weeks of pregnancy. The delivery was complicated and the baby's condition was poor. He could hardly breathe, and a ventilator in the hospital was out of order. That is why we came. We took the baby into the vehicle and began intensive therapy. We stabilized his hemodynamics, connected him to a mechanical ventilator, and took him to Poltava. We were on our way for four hours, and all this time the boy was breathing thanks to the vehicle's equipment. We transported him successfully and countered the threat to his life."

Doctors have their own good omens. They rarely talk about them, unless a special occasion arises. A new type B special vehicle donated to doctors by the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation became such an occasion for Olha Kocherha, the head of Oleksandria Emergency Medical Service Station. According to her, the personnel of the healthcare facility consider the new vehicle fortunate and blessed. This is because the first call the vehicle responded to came from the church.

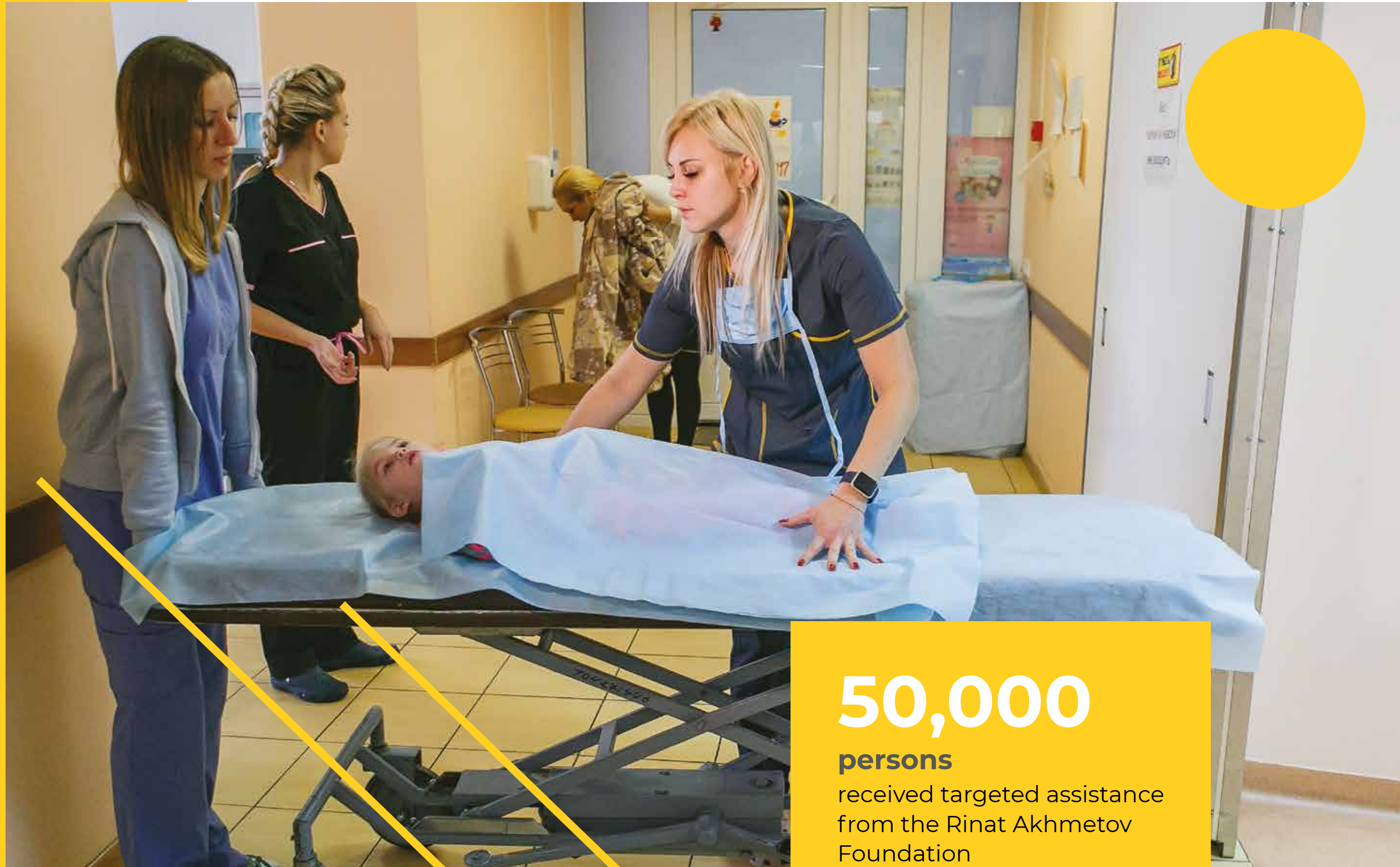

Target Assistance

Target Assistance is the very first program implemented by the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation. Launched in 2006, it aims at supporting people in tough times and those in need of urgent medical treatment. The program is based on the fundamental principle laid by Rinat Akhmetov – to help here and now.

Target Assistance has become the backbone of Rinat Akhmetov's personal charity. Many lines of the Foundation's activity have grown from this program. Later they became individual projects, which are now brought under umbrella of the Rinat Akhmetov – Saving Lives and Rinat Akhmetov for Children programs.

Mykola Nyzhnikovsky was 11 when he and three other boys were injured in a unknown shell blast in Volodarske village near Mariupol.

Residents of surrounding houses recounted that the wounded Mykola crawled up to a curb, picked up his severed foot, and tried to put his leg together.

Surgeons amputated Mykola's both feet and his right forearm. He suffered a severe brain injury, and a shell fragment damaged his left eye. His three-year-old brother Danylo did not make it to the hospital. The Rinat Akhmetov Foundation helped provide the necessary antibiotics and antimicrobial drugs for the boy.

Now Mykola is 16. This terrible tragedy has not broken him down. The boy goes in for swimming. For three and a half years, he has won 14 gold, 4 silver, and 3 bronze medals in various competitions.

Today his dream is to become a Paralympic champion.

On July 30, 2020, Mykola swam across the Dnieper River and set a record of Ukraine.

Helping children has always been a priority for Rinat Akhmetov, especially when it comes to saving a child's life.

This includes efforts on the prevention of social orphanhood, medications for critically ill children, food aid, psychological and physical rehabilitation of boys and girls living in the conflict area, innovative implants for children with heart defect and hearing impairment, complex surgeries, and projects that help adolescents from orphanages prepare for their independent life.

Rinat Akhmetov for Children. Healthy Heart

Since 2013, the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation has been helping children diagnosed with heart disease. In 2017, the Foundation launched the project *Rinat Akhmetov for Children. Healthy Heart* to respond and prevent the disease on a system-wide basis.

Within its framework, children have the heart defect closed with a special implant, an occluder, during corrective surgical procedures performed in the country's leading heart clinics:

- Amosov National Institute of Cardiovascular Surgery
- Okhmatdit National Children's Specialised Hospital
- Heart Institute of the Ministry of Health of Ukraine.

Roman Naboka from Komyshevakha village, Luhansk Oblast, was born on December 31, just before the New Year of 2014. A few days later, the boy's mother, Olena, took the baby and her three other kids to a cellar, as the village was under continuous shellfire. The family lived there for almost two months. When the armed conflict in Donbass began to subside, the mother had a new reason to fret.



"We noticed that there was never a blush on the son's cheeks," said the child's mother. After the medical examination, the doctors established a terrible diagnosis: congenital heart disease. The kid needed an urgent surgery. The Rinat Akhmetov Foundation helped little Roman. He became the first participant of the project Rinat Akhmetov for Children. Healthy Heart. On 1 February 2017, the boy received an implant at the Centre for Cardiology and Cardiac Surgery. The occluder closed the defect in his heart and made him completely healthy. "We are infinitely grateful for your immediate response and help in saving our son Roman's life. He finally has a blush on his cheeks. Thank you for saving our son's little heart." Olena Naboka



Rinat Akhmetov for Children. I Can Hear Now

The Rinat Akhmetov Foundation has been helping children with hearing impairment since 2007. This help grew into the system-wide and large-scale assistance in 2018 when the Foundation launched the project *Rinat Akhmetov for Children. I Can Hear Now*. It provides children with high-sensitivity earphones that enable them to learn and develop in the same way as any other children.

Dmytro Lakey from Zaporizhia is three years old. The boy was growing up quickly and developing well: he learned to sit on his own at the age of six months and started toddling after six months. His parents were worried just about one thing – the boy was always silent.

For quite a long time, Dmytro's parents had been taking him to doctors until they established the correct diagnosis: grade 4 of hearing loss. For the kid to hear the world around him and the voices of his parents, he needed a modern hearing aid (earphones). The family did not have money for this, but the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation helped the kid. Now he can hear!

Rinat Akhmetov for Children. Medications for Children

Ukraine's unprecedented project, Medications for Children, was launched by the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation in 2015, when severely ill children in Donbass could not access vital medicines because of the armed conflict. The Foundation delivered necessary medications to pharmacies in frontline villages in the government-controlled area.

received help under the project *Rinat Akhmetov for Children. Medications for Children.* They were provided with more than 4,400 sets of vital medicines: insulin, test strips, anticonvulsant and antiasthmatic drugs.



Natalia Polishchuk lives in Donetsk with her husband and two children. Her younger son, Artem, underwent several surgical procedures on the diaphragm and heart in the first years of his life. He was making good progress after that, but later he suffered from suffocation attacks at nights. Doctors diagnosed bronchial asthma and warned to take medications every day, lifelong. When the armed conflict broke out in Donbass, it was impossible to get the medicines. Looking at her kid's sufferings, Natalia was in despair. The young woman began to go regularly to the government-controlled area in Mariupol to pick up the pills, which the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation purchased for Artem. These medicines saved the little boy's life.

Rinat Akhmetov for Children. Rehabilitation of Injured Children

In Donbass, 220,000 children are exposed to life-threatening risks every day because of unexploded ordnance. Since the outbreak of the armed conflict, more than 260 children have been injured. They need medical treatment and rehabilitation or else they have no chance to recover either physically or psychologically. The Rinat Akhmetov Foundation is the only organization in Ukraine that provides for the rehabilitation of injured children from Donbass on a system-wide basis.

Tamara Romanenko is six years old. The girl was wounded during the shelling of Marinka three years ago, in July 2017. A shell fragment hit her stomach and only miraculously left her internal organs untouched. The wounds healed over time, but the little girl completely stopped speaking and smiling. The project *Rinat Akhmetov for Children. Rehabilitation of Injured Children* helped bring the girl's smile back. Tamara underwent several rehabilitation courses in the best health resorts in Ukraine. Her individual rehabilitation program had a good effect.

The project *Rinat Akhmetov for Children. Peaceful Summer* was launched in 2015 when it became clear that children living close to the hostilities needed psychological rehabilitation.

The project seeks to help children relieve emotional tension so that the stress does not lead to neuroses and psychosomatic diseases in the future.

Sashko Pronarovych lives in Novoluhanske. His childhood is accompanied by explosions and gunfire. One day, bullets flew by right over the boy's head, as armed men were trying to shoot down a drone.

Over time, any loud sound caused almost a convulsive state or shiver for the boy. Psychologists and communications with other children who had similar fears helped Sashko. He has overcome unsociability and begun enjoying his childhood again.

Olena and Viktor Podolets are puppet theatre actors in Rivne. After their wedding, they dreamt of having children, but they could not become parents for medical reasons. Olena was a regular reader of happy stories of adoption on the web portal *Rinat Akhmetov for Children. No to Orphanhood!*. One day she asked her husband: "May we adopt a child?" He seemed to be waiting for this question and replied immediately: "Let's do it!" Today, the Podolets' house is filled with children's laughter. There are two boys here: five-year-old Anton and three-year-old Tymofiy. The boys are biological brothers both abandoned in a maternity hospital. "I really doubted it that I could love someone else's child, and now we have two adopted kids, and I even forget that I am not their biological mother," says the happy mother.

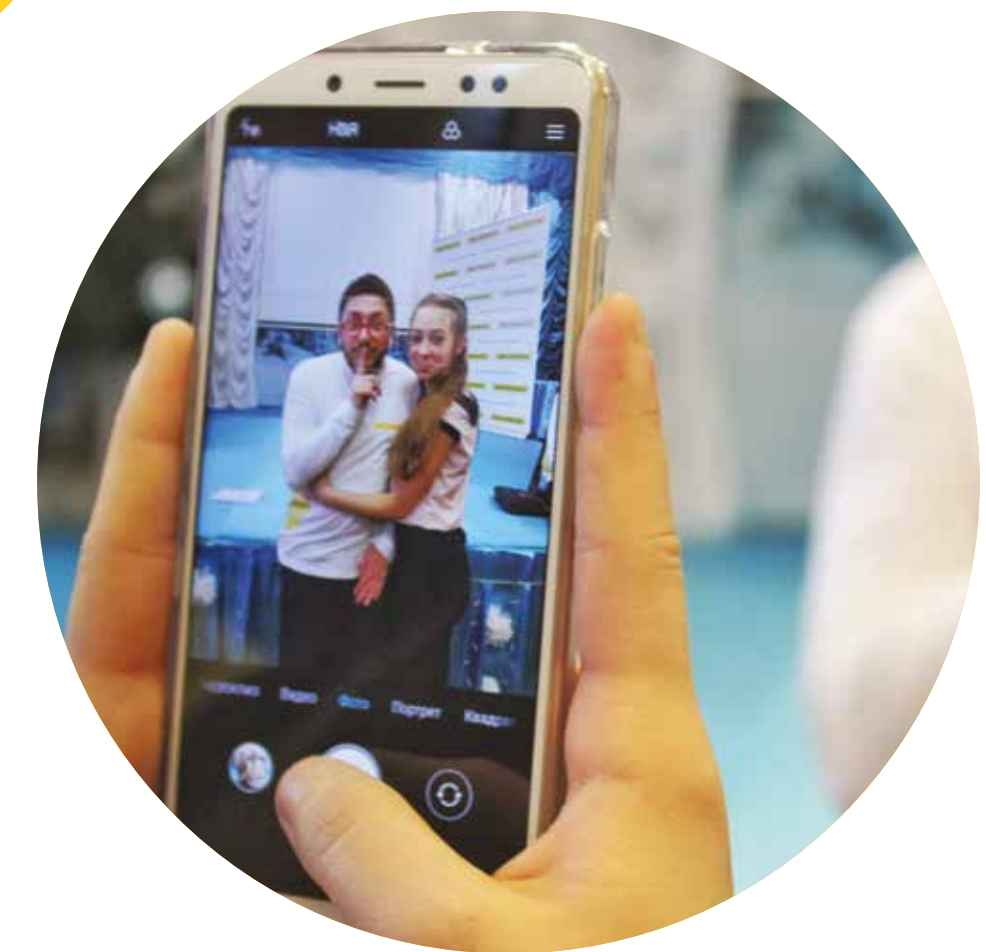


Rinat Akhmetov for Children. Your Superpower

The management of the fire department promised to keep a working place for the boy

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Rinat Akhmetov – Here to Help

When the armed conflict broke out in Donbass, millions of people were on the brink of survival. Rinat Akhmetov gave a helping hand to fellow residents in Donbass who were in need. He pooled all resources to help civilians in Donetsk and Luhansk oblasts and tasked the Foundation to help effectively and timely, make decisions instantly and work 24/7 to help those who lived through hunger, shelling, and loss of their homes and faced grief and despair after the death of their loved ones.

Since 2014, the program *Rinat Akhmetov – Here to Help* has saved millions of people's lives. These are millions of fates, millions of life stories that must not be forgotten. The Foundation is also tasked to preserve civilians' witness accounts. War is said to have no face and no voice. This is not true! It is the voices of civilians who suffered in Donbass.



Rinat Akhmetov Humanitarian Center

The largest initiative of the Foundation – the Rinat Akhmetov Humanitarian Center – was established on August 6, 2014. The initiative is based on the principle laid down by Rinat Akhmetov: “To help those who are in trouble here and now.” From the first days of the armed conflict, the Humanitarian Center helped civilians on a daily basis, saving the elderly, children and people with disabilities from hunger, and thus averting the humanitarian catastrophe threatening Donbass.

The Humanitarian Center worked on both sides of the contact line for more than three years.

On February 28, 2017, the Foundation’s activities in the non-government controlled area were suspended and then banned.

Evacuation and Resettlement

The Rinat Akhmetov Foundation was the first organization to help evacuate civilians from the area of hostilities. In the first turn, evacuation was offered to those who had no help or support: women, elderly people, children, inmates of public institutions, boarding schools and orphanages.

As part of the *Evacuation and Resettlement* project, the Foundation's personnel often had to deal with very challenging issues like evacuation of bedridden patients, families with small children, as well as evacuation of the entire boarding schools, orphanages and social shelters.

In summer 2014, about 40,000 residents of the region were evacuated to safety (including almost 15,000 children). About 7,000 people were placed in 29 recreational facilities.

May 26, 2014 is one of the most terrifying days in the life of Inna Ismailova, a resident of Sloviansk. She recalls how shells were literally flying over her head, how everything around her exploded and boomed and echoed in her ears.

The Rinat Akhmetov Foundation helped Inna and her family move to a safe place. Once safe and recovered from stress, she began to help the Foundation evacuate other people.

"Many civilians were killed, shells hit residential buildings and the Research Laboratory near my house. We started thinking where to go and tried to find out if there was anyone trying to help people in Sloviansk. I searched on the web and immediately found out about the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation. I called the hotline in the middle of the shelling! They responded immediately and offered to go to Sviatohirsk, where they were ready to receive people."

I don't know who else helps as much as the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation. I have not seen any other organizations that would have helped that much.'

Impact Study. Social Value Study of the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation's Food Aid Initiative

Impact Study or Social Value Study is a unique methodology for Ukrainian philanthropy, which explores the impact of social projects on specific indicators of the quality of life of people. The methodology has already established itself in the world. In particular, it is used by the UK government in the planning and assessment of reforms. The methodology was also approved by the World Bank.

The study was conducted by Envoy Partnership, an independent social value and impact management consultancy specializing in assessment of the impact and efficiency of charitable health and wellbeing programs, family support programs, as well as initiatives for rehabilitation, assistance for children and elderly people. The company conducted more than 100 successful social impact studies in various sectors in the UK, France, Switzerland, Sweden and Australia.

The aid provided by Rinat Akhmetov is still in the memory of Donbass residents. People remember long queues for food stretching out across the city.

Women with small children had to wait in long queues as well: for instance, Natalia Andrienko from Avdiivka, a mother of three children. Her youngest child, son Eldar, was born after the beginning of the armed conflict.

To measure the impact of the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation's humanitarian assistance on the life of Natalia Andrienko and millions of other Donbass residents, a reputable consulting company Envoy Partnership (UK) conducted an impact study of the Foundation's Humanitarian Aid Food Initiative.

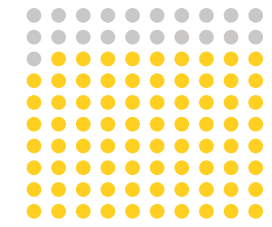

Museum of Civilian Voices founded by the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation

The mission of the Museum is to collect, organize and share stories of Donbass civilians and, thus, use this resource for better understanding of life amid the conflict. For the sake of a better future.

“Today, we cannot open the museum in Donetsk, so we want to create an online museum. It will function as an online archive, an online exhibition, online and offline projects and as a media. Created in 2014, the Humanitarian Center provided humanitarian aid that reached an unprecedented scale and, in fact, saved a million human lives. And now, the Museum of Civilian Voices is created to preserve these witness accounts, which are the real stories of people from the coal mining region.”

The life of Valentyna Kunina from Mariupol was split into the before and after January 24, 2015. The woman was at work when the city came under shelling.

“It was something unimaginable. I only remember trying to hide somewhere. Then I ran home. I saw a shell hit our apartment. My daughter-in-law was killed by shell fragments. She was lying in blood on the floor. Her daughter Ania, my granddaughter, was lying next to her with a shell fragment in her head. Her life was saved by the intensive care unit at a hospital. But even now when she hears any loud noises she hides in the storage closet and often cries for her mother,” says Valentyna. Valentyna became like a mother to the child. Caring for her granddaughter is the only thing that gives her confidence to believe in the future.

“I dream of seeing Ania grow up,” says Valentyna Kunina.

The story of the woman and her family is one of the first in the archive of the Museum of Civilian Voices founded by the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation in 2020.



Offline projects of the Museum

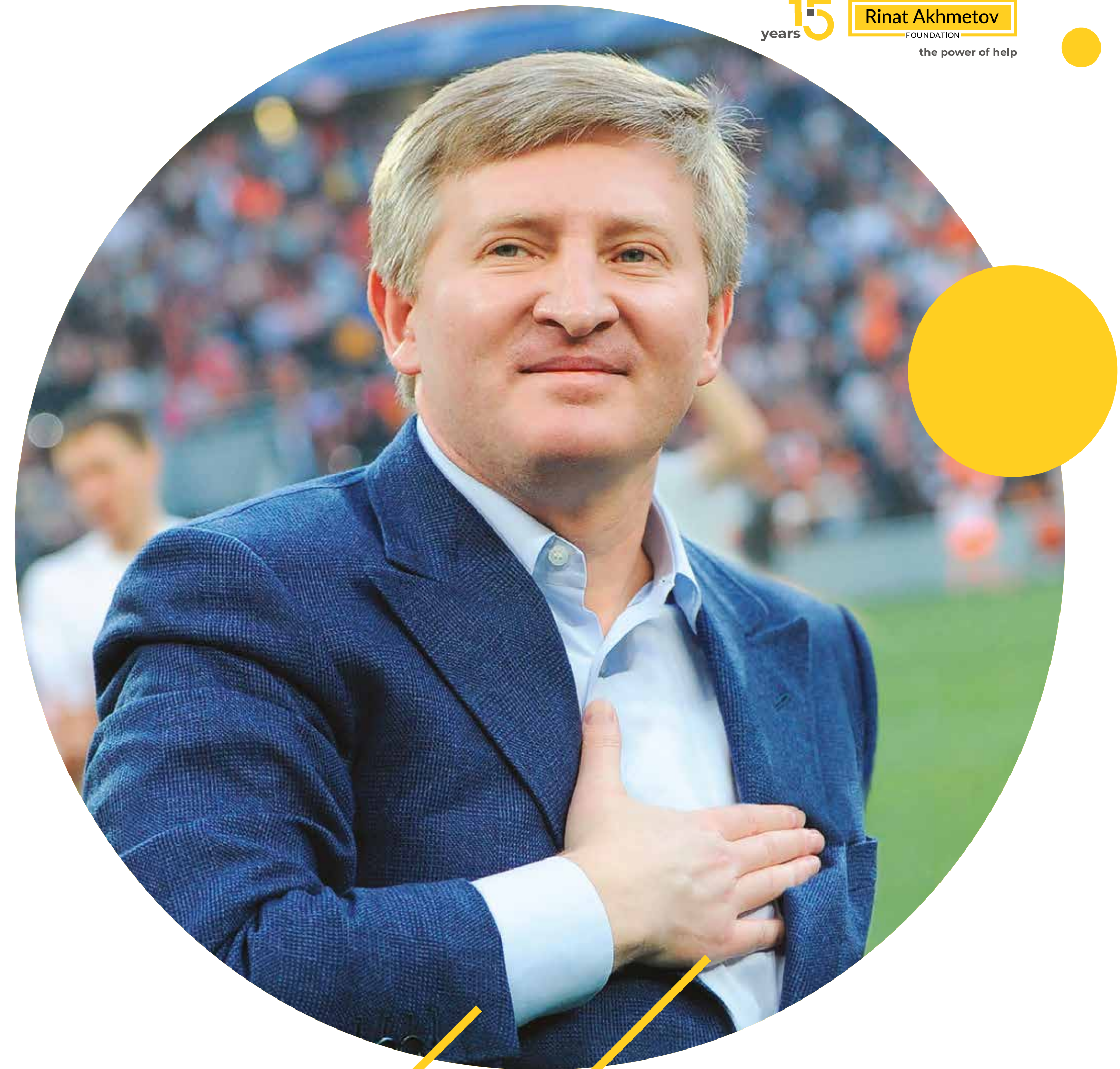
The first offline project of the Museum of Civilian Voices was the creation of the Rose Alley.

As part of the Week of Peace Initiative in Mariupol and Zaporizhia, the Foundation planted a thousand rose bushes as a symbol of the first thousand stories shared by the people. The Foundation will plant roses – the symbol of Donetsk – in Ukrainian cities every year. The number of roses will be equal to the number of stories told.



"In 2014, a disaster struck my homeland Donbass. The disaster is known as "war". It spared no one, neither children nor the elderly. It was really breaking my heart and I was thinking of one thing only – how to help my fellow citizens. What can I do to save them? It turned out that I was not the only one asking myself these questions. The heads of our businesses and companies called me and said: "We are ready to help! What can we do?" So, we combined all our efforts and our potential and created the Humanitarian Center. The staff and volunteers of the Humanitarian Center, the most caring people I have ever met in my life, worked 24/7, with no days off or holidays, risking their lives every day and every minute. They were not afraid of anything and did not spare themselves. They did everything in their power to help the most vulnerable people: children, the elderly, single mothers, and people with special needs. They helped people leave the hotbeds of the conflict, and brought them food and medication. Finally, they just supported them with kind and warm words. This is also very important! Every day of the Center's work means thousands of saved fates. And thousands of witness accounts - stories of troubles and sufferings during the war. Stories of people who have lost their homes, who have been saved and finally found the peaceful life. This is a painful non-healing wound for us. But at the same time, we are proud of the tremendous work the Humanitarian Center has done. I don't want these stories to be erased from our memories, I want them to remain with us forever. I am confident that if we remember we will be able to comprehend. And thus, each of us will do everything to ensure the tragedy is never repeated. But first, the war must be stopped! And those who can make it happen must take every effort to do so! Our children and our parents must live in a peaceful, happy and prosperous Donbass."

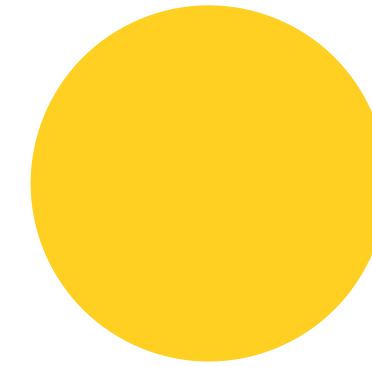

Implemented Projects



Implemented Projects

Over 15 years of its existence, the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation implemented about 70 projects and programs in the area of healthcare, education and culture. These are both local initiatives and national projects addressing social problems of the Ukrainian society. By taking a system-wide approach and increasing the scale of operations, the Rinat Akhmetov Foundation managed to become the leading charity in Ukraine. All the ongoing projects of the Foundation are built on and driven by the experience gained during the implementation of the Foundation's very first projects, which were closed to be transformed into the new format.

PROGRAM EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Project Digital Future Journalism (2007-2014)

helped train a sufficient number of professionals in the online segment to be employed by Ukrainian media editorial offices. It also enhanced the prestige of Ukrainian journalism abroad and contributed to the technical development of Ukrainian media editorial offices. The project participants included 150 editors and journalists from 68 national and regional media.

Project Doctorate Program in Mass Communication (2008-2014)

made it possible to create the first doctoral program in Ukraine facilitating integration of the national educational system into the EU educational system following Ukraine's accession to the Bologna Process.

Project Digital Media for Universities (2011-2015)

provided university journalism schools with professional lecturers of the Digital Media discipline.

PROGRAM TARGET ASSISTANCE

Project Help in Emergency (2006-2014)

was designed to assist those who suffered from natural or man-caused disasters, as well as families who lost their loved ones as a result of such tragic events.

PROGRAM NO TO ORPHANHOOD!

Project Saving a Family for a Child, Donetsk oblast (2010-2014)

set a goal to reduce the number of orphans and children deprived of parental care by 30% by 2014. The idea was to early detect the families who are struggling, introduce new approaches to working with families and develop family-based forms of parenting for those children who cannot return to their biological family.

Project Social Orphanhood Prevention Technologies (2013-2015)

improved the quality of social services provided by social workers to children and families in difficult life situations.

Project Ukrainian Large Families (2008-2010)

helped improve the living conditions for 45 families with 10 or more children.

The Project No to Orphanhood! implemented in partnership with FC Shakhtar (2012-2013)

helped open two family-type orphanages.

Project Mentorship (2016-2017)

provided assistance to adolescent orphans from care facilities.

Project A Family for a Child, Dnipropetrovsk Oblast (2011-2015)

was developed to reduce the number of orphans and children deprived of parental care in children's care facilities of Dnipropetrovsk Oblast by 20% annually through adoption and placement of children into the family-type environment.

PROGRAM MUSEUM DEVELOPMENT

Project Restoring the Metropolitan's House at Sophia of Kyiv National Sanctuary (2006-2009)

The Metropolitan's House underwent restoration and was repaired in accordance with international scientific standards.

Project Pyrohiv Museum (2008-2011)

helped upgrade Pyrohiv Museum.

Lviv State Museum of Natural History received a grant from the Foundation.

The project allowed the museum to restore the carcass of a prehistoric mammoth and of a rhino.

HEALTHCARE PROJECTS

Project *Let's Stop Tuberculosis in Ukraine (2008-2014)*

helped curb the TB epidemic in the country by expanding access to high-quality services relating to early detection and treatment of tuberculosis.

Project *Telemedicine (2013)*

was designed to create an efficient telemedicine network for cancer management and ensured sustainable development of the telemedicine network in nine clinics of the country.

Project *Let's Stop Tuberculosis in Donetsk Oblast (2007–2015)*

helped reduce TB incidence and mortality in Donetsk Oblast.

Project *Supporting Donetsk Regional Tumor Treatment Center*

helped the healthcare facility move towards the European standards. It provided access to cancer diagnostics and treatment in accordance with international standards.

Project *Supporting Cancer Clinics in Western Ukraine (2010–2015)*

made it possible to buy 23 units of equipment for oncology centers in Western Ukraine.

Project *Mobile Women's Health Consultation (2012–2015)*

provided an opportunity to get cancer diagnostics and treatment in accordance with international standards.

Project *E-Health (2011-2015)*

increased the efficiency of healthcare services and improved access to highly specialized medical services through the use of modern telecommunication equipment in oncology, cardiology and general medicine.

PROGRAM LITTLE MOTHERLAND

Project *Supporting Children's Healthcare Institutions (2012–2014)*

was launched to support medical institutions in Donetsk by providing the necessary equipment and supplying medicines for treatment of patients.

Project *Mongrel Dog (2010–2014)*

helped introduce humane methods to manage stray animal population in Donetsk.

PROGRAM RINAT AKHMETOV HUMANITARIAN CENTER

Project *Humanitarian Assistance (2014)*

helped satisfy the basic needs for food of the most socially vulnerable segments of the population (pensioners, people with disabilities, large families) in Donbass on both sides of the contact line.

Project *Psychological Assistance for Children (2014-2017)*

helped children and their parents overcome consequences of stress caused by the armed conflict in Donbass. As part of the project, crisis psychologists were trained on the War Trauma training course to provide qualified psychological assistance to civilian population of Donetsk and Luhansk oblasts in the conflict area, as well as to internally displaced persons.
